Judging Criteria (opens in new tab)

Rules of Procedure:

- * The speaker should be expected to discuss with a degree of originality, and in an interesting manner, the topic chosen.
- * The speakers should be given wide latitude in the ideas they express, but they should be held closely accountable for the manner in which they are expressed.
- * Speakers must not be penalized for expressing views with which the judge happens to disagree.
- * It is suggested, but not obligatory, that the topic be a subject of contemporary significance.
- * The speech must be one that has been composed by the student delivering it.
- * The speech must be memorized. If the speaker refers to prepared notes of any kind or a script during the presentation, the speaker will be disqualified.



Congress Balloting


There are two tabs for Congress ballots. The first is the tab for individual speech scores for each student.

Type feedback as the student speaks. At the end of the speech, score the speech 1-6 (6 is best), and click SAVE.

You will also score the Presiding Officer. Click the PO box at the far right of the screen, then add comments and a score. You will fill out <u>ONE</u> PO ballot for a 90-minute session and <u>TWO</u> ballots for a 2-hour or longer session.

Speeches Rankings

INSTRUCTIONS FOR SCORERS: Write one ballot for **each speech** and one for the **Presiding Officer**. DO NOT write ballots for students who do not speak on a B/R. PLEASE WRITE YOUR BALLOTS WHILE THE STUDENTS SPEAK. Scores are on a scale from 1 (very poor) to 6 (outstanding). Be sure to provide comments to help the students improve. Scores below 3 MUST be justified with substantial comments.

At the end of the session, select and rank the TOP EIGHT legislators in the chamber (ranked 1-8, where 1 is best). The Presiding Officer is eligible and must be considered.

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INSTRUCTIONS FOR PARLIAMENTARIAN: In a separate document (Tabroom limitations--sorry), write comments for the Presiding Officers and include your scores (1-6, higher is better) in the comments. Then, at the end of the last session, copy and paste your comments into ballots for all four POs and rank ALL of the legislators in the chamber (where 1 is best).

You must give points to a presiding officer

This tournament requires you to mark the presiding officer of the session and award them points for presiding (under the Speeches tab) before you may submit rankings.

Congress Balloting

Scroll down on the rankings tab, and you will find a place to RANK your top 8 speakers for the round.

The speech scores you gave them will be visible for your reference, as well as a speaking score average.

Remember that rankings should also consider legislators' conduct and involvement in the chamber throughout the entire session. Click SUBMIT to file your ballot.




Debate Balloting

There are two parts to the online debate ballot, though they both appear on the same screen. The first part (shown) is where you submit your actual decision for the round.



Debate Balloting

The last part of the ballot is your REASON FOR DECISION and comments to the debaters. This is right below the decision and point box you saw in the last slide. Just scroll down.
