PLEASE NOTE THAT THE PURPOSE OF THIS DOCUMENT IS TO PROVIDE JUDGES WITH GUIDELINES AND RULES OF FORENSICS EVENTS. FOR NFL EVENTS, THIS DOCUMENT ADHERES TO NFL RULES. FOR CFL-ONLY EVENTS, THE CFL MANUAL IS FOLLOWED.

NOTE: POLICY DEBATE IS NOT INCLUDED IN THIS PRESENTATION.

General Guidelines: What to do

- Turn your cell phone off and remind students to do so as well.
- Come in with a positive attitude.
 Remember that these are KIDS.
- O Have a stopwatch. Generally, cell phone timers are discouraged, as the phone may go off during a round. Time penalties cannot be assessed if you do not use a digital timer.
- Feel free to write while students are talking/performing. They expect it, and it will provide them with more valuable feedback than if you try to remember things after the fact.
- CHECK AND MAKE SURE THAT THE KIDS IN FRONT OF YOU (USUALLY BY CODE) MATCH WHAT IS ON YOUR MASTER BALLOT.
- Provide both positive and critical feedback to performers. Nothing is worse than ranking last in a room when one's only comment is "great job!"

- o Familiarize yourself with the rules of the event prior to stepping into the round.
- Check and make sure that you did not accidentally get assigned to a round in which your own child is competing. It doesn't generally happen, but sometimes parents and their kids have different last names and the Tab Staff is unaware of this.
- o Give time signals if the kids ask for them. Standard is "two down", which means hold two fingers up when they have two minutes left, one when they have one minute, a "C" at 30 seconds, and a fist when they are entering the grace period.
- Ensure that students respect the classroom they are using.
- ENJOY. These kids work hard, and are here to entertain you (among other things).

General Guidelines: What NOT to do


- Please do not refuse to judge a given event. The Tab Staff will keep you in your assigned pool as much as is humanly possible.
- Please do not wait until the end of the round to start writing comments on ballots. We can't start next rounds until all ballots are in, so this delays the entire tournament.
- Please do not ask the students what the rules of an event are. If you have a question about how a round progresses, check with the Tab Staff when you return your ballot.

- Please do not disclose the results of rounds or give oral critique. Again, this slows up the entire tournament.
- Please do not text, surf the web, or read while students are performing.
- Please do not write mean or petty comments as critique.
- Please do not ask the Tab Staff
 what time a next round starts.
 We don't run on an exact
 schedule because we depend on
 the timely return of ballots. We
 will try to keep you updated.

II. Judges

a. First, log into Tabroom to access your assigned judging rounds during the tournament. Then, click on your email address in the upper right corner to view your rounds.




b. Here, you will see a list of your upcoming rounds to judge.

- d. Once you join a round, you will be taken to an NSDA Campus page where you will see the judge and your opponents.
 - On the Campus page, you will also find access to a timer, file transfer, and contact tab.
- When the round is over, go back to your Tabroom dashboard (where you joined the round).
- f. Fill out the winner of the round, speaker points, and any comments/ballots for the debaters, and hit submit when you have filled out all information. Please at a MINIMUM include which side won in your RFD (Reason for Decision). Contact your team leaders/coaches for more information on online balloting.

Troubleshooting

II. In-Round

IE Master Ballots (when online not available)

- Master ballots are given to each judge in an IE event. On this ballot, you will see a list of codes in a given speaking order (this order is SET unless it is a tournament which allows doubleentry).
- As the judge, your first job is to make sure everyone is present (CHECK THE CODES).
- After the performances, you will rank the students in order of their skill (1 is best).
- You will also assign speaking points. These are used to break ties. They range from 80-100; 80 is a punishment, indicating that the student has offended you or wasted your time. Please refrain from scoring under 85 unless this is your intent.
- Please return the master ballots AND the critique forms IN SPEAKER ORDER to the ballot check-in table as soon as possible after the round is over.

Master Ballots for IE, SAMPLE

While each IE event has its own Master Ballot, they all follow the form you see here. The rules for the event are listed on top, and the list of students appears below. Please remember that speaking order is SET, except for tournaments in which double-entry is allowed. Speaker points are written on the STUDENT critique sheets, not on the Master.

Duo Interpretation of Literature

Roder of Procedure

- The two interpreters are to render a dynamic moment, from memory, utilizing appropriate vocal expression,
 gentures and interactions. The interpreten will vocally and physically respond to each other's verbal and nonverbal cues while maintaining an off stage focus. Students are not allowed to make direct eye contact with
 one another except during the introduction.
- 2. The selection must be from a single published play, single fictional or non-fictional work. A series of poems is permitted. The poetry may be taken from a variety of sources united by a single poet. The suther's words as published in the literature may not be altered for this presentation with the exception that cutting is permitted. Speakers may not take lines belonging to one character in the script and apply them to a different character in the performance. The material may be serious, humorous or both. Each interpreter may present one or more characters. Any singing must be limited to a maximum of 30 seconds total within the presentation.
- The selection must begin from center stage. Performers are not allowed to make physical contact with each other during the performance, except during the introduction. Physical movement is restricted to performers moving around one another, switching positions, pivoting from side to side or turning around completely. Students must remain stending.
- No costumes or properties may be used.
- The presentation should not exceed 10 minutes, including at most one minute of introduction and transitional material other than the suffer's words. Judge may not sweed first place to any due interpretation that performs beyond the thirty-accord gauce period.
- Any questions regarding rules infringement should be brought to the attention of the Tabulation Room Staff immediately after the round, and not to the student.

Debate Ballots (when online not available)

- As a debate judge, you will receive a ballot for each round. Students are not given ballots in debate.
- Please ensure that the right debaters are in the room. If the pairings are thrown off, this will drastically slow the tournament, as ALL rounds of the event will have to be re-paired (and, in rare cases, possibly even RE-RUN.)
- Debate points range from 20-30. Just because a student or pair wins, that does not necessarily mean a score of 30. Please remember that points under 24 indicate that the student/team was poor at debating.
- Students will generally keep their own time and police each other; however, feel free to keep your own time as well, particularly in regards to Prep Time.
- Please do NOT disclose results or give oral critique. This slows the tournament. Turn in ballots as quickly as possible. You do not need to turn in Flows.
- In most debate events, sides are set. The top of a ballot may read "flip for sides" in later rounds, however. It may also read "flip unless previously met", which indicates that if students have met before, they reverse the sides from their prior meeting.

Congress Ballots (when online not available)

- Congress scores range from 1-6 or 1-8, depending on the length of the sessions (NFL is 1-8). A score of 1 is a punishment: either the speech was incredibly short (20 seconds-ish), the student was offensive in the extreme, or the student was out of order (off-topic, or spoke on the wrong side).
- The Presiding Officer also receives a score for his/her work in keeping order and procedure in the chamber. There is a special ballot for this purpose.
- NFL ballots have room for 3 speeches' assessments. If the student speaks a 4th time, start a new sheet. There is also a section on the bottom for the judge to comment on questioning. This is not scored, but it may affect a student's ranking on your preferential ballot.
- On the Judge's Preference ballot, you will list in RANK order, who you consider to be the best legislators. The PO is eligible for this list. You may NOT rank your own school in 1st place.

- Introduction: The introduction must name the work and author, provide necessary background information and establish the mood. If using a teaser, or if lines from the selection are used in the introduction, the speakers must adhere to the rules of the event.
- Transmission Style: The speaker should convey the message in a sincera, housest and realistic attempt to recreate the spirit of the original presentation. Although the style of delivery chosen by the speaker should be judged in light of the purpose of the speach, artificiality is to be discredibed. The message should be conveyed credibly and convincingly as if the words were the speaker's own. This event is an interpretation, not an impersonation.
- Youal Delivery: The speaker should be articulate and fluent. The speaker should make use of contrast,
 making use of the elements of vocal variety: pitch, volume, rate, passing, phrasing, stress, tone. The
 speaker should be conversational and concerned, possionate and pleasing. The speaker should be in
 control of the words and the emotions. The speaker should sound confident and self-assured, and seem
 sager to enlighten the audience. The speaker should convey the message in a sincere, honest, and realistic
 strip in an attempt to recreate the spirit of the original presentation.
- <u>Physical Delivere</u>: The speaker should be physically open to the audience and use body language that
 invites the audience into the world of the declaimer. The speaker should vary facial expression to
 accommutate the natural flow of thoughts and feshings. The speaker should make eye contact with the
 audience. The speaker's stance should be erect and controlled, without distracting movements. Movement,
 if used, should be motivated by transitions in thought or mood. Gestures should be visible, effectively
 used for sumbasis, and varied.
- Overall Effect: The speaker should project an understanding of the speaker's message. The speaker should
 instill in the andience a concern for the speak's content. The original speaker's message should not be
 overshadowed by the delivery. Consideration should be given to the oratorical merit of the selection.

- Environment: Each character should create a world around him or her. Movement should be used to create a three-dimensional servironment in which the character exist. Pannisme, if used, should be accurate and realistic Gestures should be fully realised, creating in just the right way what the performer intends the audience to see. When doing a multiple character selection, the performer should create effective interaction between the character.
- Overall Effect. The overall performance should build to various moments and have a climan. The story should be complete and easy to follow. The performance should display another world outside of the performance space.

- Introduction: The introduction must name the work and author, provide necessary background information and establish the mood. If using a baser, or if lines from the selection are used in the introduction, the speakers must athere to the rules of the event.
- <u>Material</u>: The material being presented should allow for interesting character choices and reasonable plot structure. The material should be appropriate for the students. Consideration should be given to the literary ment of the selection.
- Interaction and environment: The performers should convince you that they truly see the other
 character(s). Each character should listen and resut, with face and body especially as the other is talking.
 What one character says or does should provoke a fitting vocal, physical and emotional response from the
 other character. The characters should see and respond to what is around them. They should take the
 sudience into the physical world of their story. The interpreters will vocally and physically respond to
 each other's verbal and non-verbal case while maintaining as off stage fieux.
- <u>Characterization</u>: Each character should convey a distinct, consistent personality, stance, and manner of
 gesturing. Each character should be sufficiently developed and should interact meaningfully with the
 other characters.

 views with which the judge happens to disagree.
- Structure: The introduction should gain attention, lead to the question, provide an answer to the
 question, and for justify the importance of the topic, and give some direction as to how the speach will
 unfold or develop. The body should be organized to best answer the question. Transitional word-adverses
 should help to move the speech from point to point. The conclusion should restate the question and
 answer, succinctly summarize the speech's main points highlighting how they led to the question's

- Content: This presentation should be an original speech developing the issue(s) raised by the selected topo. - <u>Introduction:</u> The introduction must name the work and author, provide necessary background information and establish the mood. If using a tensor, or if lines from the selection are used in the introduction, the speakers must adhere to the rules of the event.
- <u>Projection of Liberature</u>: The interpreter should demonstrate a clear understanding of the literature and project its meaning, message and tone. The speaker should capture and convey the plot and/or development. Imagery should be carefully colored so as to promote audience understanding and appreciation.
