What's New in Revision 23.10

Overview

Revision 23.10 of the *FGCCFL Student Congress Manual* adopts relevant sections of the September 23 *NCFL Student Congress Manual* where consistent with local competition. This revision also contains minor clarifications and technical corrections. Substantive changes from the previous FGCCFL manual are highlighted in the manual text. Changes that affect the regular order of business are summarized below; the most important ones are starred.

* Abstentions in Voting

§ 13(d). The PO must call for abstentions on any majority question on which a recorded vote is taken. Members are still not required to vote, and there is still no quorum rule. Abstentions are not taken on two-thirds votes or on voice votes.

* Adjournment & Recesses

§§ 11(a)-(b). NCFL has formalized the practice of going into recess between sessions and adjourning (*sine die*) only at the end of the last session. FGCCFL will follow. All other recesses are **out of order** except in cases of extreme need, supported by the Parliamentarian.

Agenda Order

§ 20(c). The chamber **may** amend its agenda (calendar) by suspension of the rules at the start of each session. Once floor debate begins, modifications are out of order for the remainder of the session.

Amendments

§§ 9(a) & 12(e). There are no questioning periods during debate on an amendment to legislation.

Chamber Designations

§ 19(a). All chambers shall operate as Houses. (At Grand Finals, the Super Congress will be a Senate.)

Minimum Speech Requirement

§§ 10(c) & 11(l). Legislation with an author (or substitute) present is entitled to a sponsorship speech, first negative, and one additional speaking opportunity on each side before it is voted on or set aside. The motion to limit debate **may not** be used to preclude the required speeches.

★ One-Sided Debate

§ 6(c). Legislators are cautioned that one-sided debate is **NOT** a productive use of the chamber's time; if debate becomes one-sided and no opposition is forthcoming, the B/R should either be laid on the table (to allow opponents to develop arguments) or put to a vote. The chamber **may not** recess to provide speechwriting time.

Questioning Periods

NCFL has adopted "direct questioning" at Nationals. FGCCFL will not adopt "direct questioning" this year, except during Super Congress at Grand Finals.
